Reporting	Requires pharmacies to annually report opioid intracompany delivery or distribution not reported by a wholesaler beginning 3/1/2020

PMP Fees		Adds a not-to-exceed \$50 fee for those accessing PMP for third-party integrations

Take-Back	Allows sheriffs to meet existing take-back requirements through "alternative method"	Allows sheriffs to meet existing take-back requirements through a "medicine disposal program"
